Junghans presents a commanding appearance for singles and couples: the Meister S Automatic and the Meister S Chronoscope

At work, at sports, and during downtime the Meister S Automatic and the Meister S Chronoscope always ensure a commanding appearance for their owners. The variations with midnight-blue dials and striking stainless steel bracelets even have an extra portion of cool. And for couples they offer a powerful partner look.

Meister-fully sporty

The new Meister S Chronoscope is a timepiece with a strong character that is never out of time: it stands for sportiness, modern technology, and competence in design and production. And it gives the wearer the opportunity to measure short time intervals, which underscores its sporty character. Automatic chronograph movement Caliber J880.1 ensures a precise time display with precision stop functionality; and it guarantees a power reserve of up to 48 hours. The look of this watch is determined by a midnight-blue dial with





gradient lacquer that becomes darker toward the perimeter. In contrast to the dark dial, the time is shown by striking, partially skeletonized stainless-steel hands and applied indexes inlaid with luminous substance, ensuring extreme legibility in differing light conditions. Black lacquered, recessed totalizers display the stopped time and a permanently running small seconds display. Alongside the time, the date and day of the week are shown in windows at 3 o'clock in a choice of German or English. The striking stainless-steel case with a massive, dynamically contoured flank guard, antireflective sapphire crystal, and water resistance of 20 bar underscore the sporty, commanding appearance of the Meister S Chronoscope.

Meister-fully sovereign

It is hard not to notice that the Meister S Automatic is related to the Meister S Chronoscope as both watches share a number of features and characteristics even if the Meister S Automatic looks somewhat downscaled. However, its powerfully designed stainless-steel case is water resistant to 20 bar thanks to the carefully sealed screwed-down steel case back secured with seven screws and the screwin crown located between two impressive crown protectors. Automatic Caliber J800.4 drives the watch from inside the robust case



with a power reserve of 38 hours. Alongside the time, this movement also shows the date and weekday, very useful information in day-to-day life. The domed dial in midnight blue gradient lacquer has been lavishly manufactured, including the individually applied indexes inlaid with luminous substance. This eco-friendly luminous substance is also found on the hour and minute hands, which allows for first-class legibility in the dark. An antireflective, scratch-resistant sapphire crystal makes for a protective dome over the dial.

Meister-ful bracelet

Both watches come on a seven-row stainless-steel link bracelet that perfectly integrates into the respective case. Four rows of links are finely satin finished, while three are polished, creating amazing visuals that correspond to the mix of surface treatments on each case. The bracelet is outfitted with a double folding clasp that is doubly secured; and fine adjustment for length is integrated into the clasp, which increases its comfort level. The only thing left for watch aficio-nados is to choose between the Meister S Chronoscope and the Meister S Automatic. Couples might want to think about getting both – that way they can swap them once in a while!

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About Junghans

Time is at home in Schramberg – and since 1861 Junghans has given it a face. This watch factory masters all the technologies involved in time measurement, from the reliable quartz movement all the way to fine mechanics. Junghans was also a trendsetter in radio-controlled technology, beginning in 1990 when it launched the first radio-controlled watch. Today, the Schramberg-based company makes its own solar-powered radio-controlled movements. An openness for new technologies and a remarkable competence in terms of design have always characterized Junghans' products – which is also on display in the current watch collections Meister, max bill, FORM, and 1972.

Junghans looks back on an equally successful and moving history. In 1903, the factory with more than 3,000 employees was the largest watch manufacturer in the world, making more than 9,000 watches every day. The development of precise mechanical movements made the company the world's third-largest chronometer manufacturer in 1956. As the official time-keeper of the summer Olympics in 1972 in Munich as well as numerous motorsports events, Junghans was also at home in the world of sports. After some highs and lows, the traditional company was taken over by Schramberg-based entrepreneurs Dr. Hans-Jochem and Hannes Steim in 2009, who brought it back on track and introduced a growth phase. To this day, Junghans conceives, designs, constructs, and manufactures all watches on its historical premises. In 2018, the "Terrassenbau" building was resuscitated in honor of its centenary jubilee; in this monument to industrial architecture, a museum allows visitors to experience the tradition of watchmaking in the Black Forest. Since 2022 Hannes Steim leads the company as its managing director with powerful innovation and imagination into the future.
